Lent Is Hope

Lent is hope. When most people think of Lent, we think of something else. Lent is seen as a time of sacrifice, or possibly service. For many centuries, the practice was to "give something up for Lent." Christians looked to the life of Jesus as the example for us to follow. We might not spend forty days fasting in the wilderness, but we can deny ourselves just a little. Giving up chocolate is one of the standards. Some deprive ourselves of a favourite drink, or even a TV show. We know that this is far from the level of deprivation that Christ endured, but it can remind us of just how much we take for granted.

In more recent years we have rediscovered the thought of "taking something on" for Lent. Reading our way through one of the gospels is an excellent way to go. Setting aside a time for daily prayer works well for some. Others offer a gift of time - to a community grouping, a friend (or even a stranger) in need. The life of Jesus was informed by the reading of scripture, prayer and reflection, compassion and service. When we take any of these on we may find our lives and our faith deepened as a result.

Whether you are drawn to any of these practices, or have discovered one of your own, it's helpful to remember that the purpose of Lent is not to feel bad. For Christians in the early centuries, the forty days of Lent were a time of preparation for baptism which would take place on Easter Sunday. It was a time of learning and growth, of encouragement and struggle, all for the purpose of receiving the gift of new life and hope. It was headed to joy and celebration.

So Lent is hope. Lent has actually always been about hope. And it is where the whole story has been pointed right from the beginning. It is a story of compassion and care, from the first moment of creation. It is the story of the birth of a people, their journey through the disasters and the triumphs of slavery and liberation, kingdom and captivity, restoration and renewal. Through all of this God was at work, sharing grace and leading us in hope. In the life of Jesus Christ we see even more clearly the character, the depth of God's love for this crazy family of ours.

As we move through Lent this year, I invite us to do so in a spirit of hope. God is still leading us, in the midst of the disasters and triumphs of our time, the struggles and the joys of our lives. We are followers of the One whose life, death and resurrection, is the most hopeful gift we have ever received. With you, I look forward to where God leads us next.



Stay in Touch



The excitement and enthusiasm for the sponsorship of Syrian refugees continues to grow. This project arose out of our imagining a world in which all have adequate shelter, food, and provisions, and are able to live in safety. With this as our vision we determined to grow our sense of mission, justice, and generosity by bringing help to Syrian refugees who long to begin a new life away from the violence and threat of terrorist

forces by sponsoring a family(ies) through an authorized refugee sponsorship program.

Our vision and mission is undergirded by guiding scripture questions and texts such as "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8) "I was a stranger and you welcomed me...just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." (Matthew 25) "Who is my neighbour?" a questioned posed to Jesus who then told a story about a man who was robbed and beaten and then was cared for by an unlikely helper. (Luke 10)

Our Refugee Sponsorship Project began with a desire to work with the other six United Churches on the North Shore. That initial desire has expanded to a three-pronged effort.

The initial commitment with the North Shore churches has demonstrated sufficient financial and volunteer resources to begin application for a second refugee family. While the first refugee family is yet to arrive a decision was made early in the new year to continue this ministry of hospitality and justice. That's the first prong.

The second is our own congregation's sponsorship of a refugee family, a decision made by the Official Board in the fall of 2015 following a request from members to become involved in this humanitarian crisis. A family of four, the Fandi family, a dad, a mom and two boys, has been identified and the application to sponsor them is underway. This family already has members of its extended family living in the Vancouver area which will prove helpful with respect to language, familiarity, and orientation. The arrival of this family is anticipated sometime this spring.

The community around WVUC continues to express interest in helping the sponsorship project to the extent that

a community group known as "North Shore Friends" has formed for the express purpose of sponsoring a fourth family. This community group has been brought under the refugee sponsorship umbrella of our congregation as is being encouraged across Canada. This partnership expands the work of sponsoring by impacting one more Syrian family who longs for safety and peace. The work and financing of this sponsorship will be carried out by "North Shore Friends" with oversight from WVUC.

Our congregation, our endowments, and our community have been generous in providing \$66,800 to fulfill our sponsorship mission. \$13,000 was forwarded to the shared project by North Shore United Churches by the end of 2015. Another \$3,500 was given for humanitarian relief overseas which will be matched by the Canadian government. Well done!

Fund raising is ongoing and could continue into the foreseeable future if peace and stability remain elusive in the Syrian region. A festival of choral delight was hosted by WVUC on February 6th featuring the choirs and music directors of North Shore United Church churches. It tickled our musical sensibilities. Many tasks need you to make this large project a success.

Stop by the Refugee Table after Sunday worship and add your name to the growing list of helpers. Can't volunteer? Your donation will help animate this effort of love and justice.





Dr. Kaplan taught a Jewish dance, and we all danced and sang. It was a wonderful day.


